Network update

As you may be aware we have received funding to host and evaluate the 0-19 Research Network and to develop a champion programme, to enable research champions to set up communities of research practice (CoRP) in their areas. At the heart of this we have 2 core aims:

- 1. To support and increase the participation and recruitment of children and families in public health research, with a focus on those underserved populations (research delivery).
- 2. To increase research engagement and capacity of public health professionals working with the 0-19 age group (research capacity building).

These aims will be supported through delivery of the following objectives:

- 1. Create 0-19 Research Champions and develop a programme to support them in championing research in their area
- 2. Facilitate events that create networking opportunities between professionals to enable collaborations
- 3. Engage regionally with HEI's with a focus on engaging students and establishing links with potential academic supervisors/researchers
- 4. Develop a sustainable prototype model for the CRN in Yorkshire and Humber (and other regions) to develop other successful networks
- 5. Develop a web presence to increase our visibility, disseminate information, ensure the sharing of timely research opportunities, signpost and facilitate connections
- 6. Develop further the project planning group of core members to operationalise the project deliverables regionally

Through this, we expect to raise the profile of research in 0-19 services and the role of the SCPHN in research, while supporting you to develop your own interest and knowledge of research.

The Network is currently funded until April 2024; there will be opportunities to be involved so please keep an eye out.

The Network happens because of a great team of people all striving towards the same goal, to make the Network a success so that we can achieve our aims.

Learning point

FAQs to the project team:

Did you find research daunting when you first became involved?

We are often asked this about when we first got involved in research. The whole team agreed that they did because of it's terminology which can sometimes be intimidating if not understood.

I am interested in research but unsure where to start?

Lisa often discusses the first steps into research course, which is run by the NIHR clinical research network Yorkshire and Humber. She completed this course and found it great in demystifying research and providing her with the relevant skills around research and it increased her confidence. Moreover, it provided her with useful training links and information around further training opportunities to develop skills in research, it also helped develop useful networks.

Is it possible as a health visitor or school nurse based in practice to get involved in delivering research projects?

Increasingly so, in Sheffield we have a newly appointed Research Health Visitor who in conjunction with the Research Dept has undertaken additional training to be able to consent and collect data for a RCT that we are delivering on.
