Network update

As you may be aware, we have received funding (2022-2024) to host and evaluate the 0-19 Research Network and to develop a champion programme, to enable Research Champions to set up Communities of Research Practice (CoRP) in their areas. At the heart of this we have 2 core aims:

- To support and increase the participation and recruitment of children and families in public health research, with a focus on those underserved populations (research delivery).
- To increase research engagement and capacity of public health professionals working with the 0-19 age group (research capacity building).

What we have been doing to meet our aims as a Network:

The Research Champions continue to run their individual community of research practice across the region, and it is clear to see how the champions have developed both personally and professionally.



On the 11th of December, the Research Champions alongside the 0-19 Research Network leads held their first Community of Research Practice (CoRP) meeting. Forming a collective of 0-19 Research Network leads from across region, representing their individual CoRP's. This has been a natural progression for the Research Champions, and we will update you around this as we move forward with this new CoRP.

Tracey and Louise attended the iHV Leadership Conference 'Leading in a Complex World' in London alongside Research Champion, Sarah Lawley, our presentation was on developing research leaders. It was a fabulous opportunity for us to highlight our individual roles in research leadership within 0-19 research practice.

The two-year funded project ending in March is nearing the end evaluation point and we are hoping to share our findings in due course.
